The Gender Centre continues to work for our community...

Vale Roberta Perkins!

Roberta Perkins died at the very end of June last year after decades of struggle for the community. From the humble beginning of Tiresias house through to becoming the statewide peak body of NSW, the Gender Centre has seen incredible change.

And it remains an exciting time to be involved in helping the Transgender and Gender Diverse community of NSW.

It's not that long ago that transgender people were almost totally rejected by the wider Australian community. And while things are far from perfect, I'm heartened by the changing conversation being presented in most media, in the way that our national workplaces continue to support us, and the slow but inexorable shifts that our health departments are making to support and uphold the right to be transgender and/or gender diverse. Birth certificate laws around the country continue to reflect changing attitudes of Australians. From Canberra, to Tasmania and now most recently with legislative change in Victoria the transgender

community is getting a taste of what it might be like to experience acceptance and support reaching across all aspects of our lives.

As transgender and gender diverse people continue to be supported and to work to overcome obstacles to acceptance, the Gender Centre has been growing and expanding too.

This year we've experienced more support requests by more people from across the lifespan of the community. We have more than doubled the number of families, children, and adolescents we are seeing. More schools are requesting help to accommodate trans students and workplace requests for assistance in transition has increased.

There's still a lot to work to do, and the Gender Centre remains committed to working with our community and allies to improve the lives of gender diverse people.

Overview:

Consolidation seems to have been the theme for 2018/19.

We began the 2018/19 year with the loss of a giant of the transgender and gender diverse community and ended it with another historical change to legislation around birth certificate law in Victoria.

Roberta Perkins, academic and trans-advocate was instrumental in convincing the then Labour government of the importance of a shelter for transgender sex workers. And so from her work and activism in creating Tiresias House for young vulnerable trans sex workers, our modern day Gender Centre was born. Roberta continued to lead the cause for transgender equality over decades and is remembered fondly by the Gender Centre and the TGD community alike.

Like Roberta's struggle to find a home for the earliest iteration of the Gender Centre, we continue to search for a new location for our expanding service. And while at times it's been a frustrating process, I continue to be heartened by the degree of support in the community for the great work that we are doing.

This past year, the Gender Centre also saw one of our community greats, Katherine Cummings, retire from the GC staff. Katherine handed over the reigns of Polare at the beginning of 2019. In her absence the GC staff continue to work to renew Polare both as tribute to her legacy, but also to take up the exciting opportunities that digital publishing have for reaching even further into our community.

The Gender Centre has also expanded some of its key services and in particular has increased the number of psychological and counselling services available to the community. This increase reflects the growing importance and focus of the Gender Centre on transgender and gender diverse people's mental health, and in

particular as a reaction to the continued negative representation of the community in some sections of the Australian media.

After the 2017 marriage equality plebiscite set an unprecedented standard for negativity and scape-grating of transgender young people, we've seen anti-trans voices in the press hone their attacks further. Over the last year debate has continued to heat up around the federal religious rights bill, ushering in a new round of anti-trans journalism. This time the focus seems to be not just on service providers like the Gender Centre, but now sets out to attack the very models of affirmative care that are central to the delivery of the services we provide.

My hope going forward into 2019/20 is that what we have witnessed over the last few years is not just an upsurge in the amount of violence, discrimination and anti-trans journalism, but rather the last gasp of an intolerant, discriminatory way of explaining the world. I hope that the lives of transgender and gender diverse people will continue to be supported and that the advocacy of people like Roberta Perkins have paved the way to a better world and one that we are moving closer and closer towards.

The Gender Centre sees individuals dealing with mental health issues such as depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress and personality disorders; those suffering from traumatic brain injuries with permanent and debilitating effects; and those on the autism spectrum.

This past year, the occurrence of depression, anxiety and suicide ideation, all relating to gender identity and presentation, has once again been very high.

Here at the Gender Centre, counselling is a place where gender identity is seen as authentic and genuine, rather than something to be questioned or assessed.

We offer therapeutic approaches to mental health issues, but also provide specialist knowledge and referral options to clients who wish to embark on medical (hormone replacement therapies and surgery) or legal transition (name and birth certificate changes).

'The most common comment we hear about counselling at the Gender Centre, is that we provide a "safe space" for clients to come and be themselves.

'Parents have brought gender diverse children to counselling, offering their kids somewhere safe to discuss and explore their identity, and to build relationships for future therapy if and when required.

Counselling Age Range: 5-18 This year the Gender Centre continued to offer counselling to youth and families.

We continue to support schools, parents and young people with our 'transition at school' process, where families and educators are able to access knowledge and resources to help make transition easier for their young person.

The Gender Centre is working to build community around trans families. We launched our Play Date project, where trans and gender diverse children and their families participated in a picnic with facilitated games, face-painting, snacks and music. This was a fantastic opportunity for parents of gender diverse children to meet other families and make ongoing connections.

Our counselling service continues to provide support and education to school counsellors including rural areas and placement opportunities to student counsellors to support trans kids.

The individual sessions had a Cognitive Behavioural Therapy focus, and showed a high success rate in improving mental health outcomes for these clients.

Gender Centre staff drive in and conduct services with pre-arranged clients over a four day period every three months in the Dubbo, Bathurst, Orange, and Parkes and surrounding towns.

T150 Service In 2018/2019 The Gender Centre continued to work with the Albion Centre to provide clinical health services to the Transgender and gender diverse community, providing a peer support worker each week.

The Gender Centre has continued to provide training to a broad range of services regarding a variety of issues relating to gender and to transgender and gender diverse persons.

The aims of the education packages are:

- To encourage service providers in all areas to work effectively with transgender and gender diverse clients, and provide support to employers in workplaces where a staff member is in transition.
- To encourage employers to uphold anti-discrimination legislation and employ transgender and gender diverse persons who present as the best person for a position.
- To encourage all organisations to treat all people, including transgender and gender diverse people, equitably.
- To support organisations to develop policy and procedures with the intent of affording transgender and gender diverse people equitable rights, opportunities and access.

The steady demand for education and training from the Gender Centre has served to reinforce the improved commitment of the wider community to become informed about transgender and gender diverse people.

The response from those attending the training has been overwhelmingly positive.

During the 2018-2019 financial year training was provided to over 600 individuals through the corporate sector, specialist women's services, universities, and employers.

Camp Us

For three days in late 2018 the Gender Centre gathered 36 TGD young people, the majority of whom were from rural and remote areas.

We ran both adventure and social activities, built friendships and resilience, and got TGD young people to connect with other TGD young people and to share their experience of

discrimination, bullying as well as the challenges of being gender diverse. Camp Us was a huge success. Parents were ecstatic. For weeks after we continued to hear how much each young person was changed by our camp. The Gender Centre is very proud to announce that due to the amazing support of the University of Sydney Union, The Gender Centre will be able to run the camp at the beginning of 2020, 2021 and 2023.

Transgender Day of Remembrance

For a number of years the Gender Centre, in partnership with the NSW Police Force, the City of Sydney and the Inner City Legal Centre have held the annual Transgender Day of Remembrance on two dates. One on the actual day of remembrance (20 November) and the second on the closest

Friday to that date at NSW Parliament House.

2018 TDoR was the largest gathering of community members and allies that we have ever seen, with approximately 350 participants attending Harmony Park.

TDoR 2018 included a diverse range of speakers from a range of backgrounds and identities. The highlight of the event occurred in the final moments of the remembrance when with the swelling chorus of the Sydney Gay & Lesbian Choir community and allies were invited to light a candle and place it amongst fallen Jacaranda blossoms at the base of the tree.

It was an extremely moving tribute to the transgender and gender diverse dead and the Gender Centre would like to thank all those who worked incredibly hard to make 2018 TDoR one of our most successful.


